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## Economic Development Efforts in Downtown Fremont: A Collaboration of the City of Fremont, Fremont Downtown Development Authority, Newaygo County, NC Brownfield Authority, State of Michigan and Fremont Downtown Property Owners

As part of Fremont’s goal to create safe, affordable rental housing downtown and stimulate economic activity in the community, the City and DDA established the Fremont Rental Rehabilitation Housing Program. To support this effort, the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program awarded the City of Fremont a \$436,600 grant for the Fremont Rental Rehabilitation Program.

Of that amount \$370,000 was eligible to be used to fund the rehabilitation of up to ten (10) vacant rental units with a majority of the units remaining “affordable” for at least five (5) years. A maximum of \$40,000 per unit was made available as long as the owner agreed to rent 51% of the units in the building to households whose incomes must not exceed 80% of the area median income (AMI) adjusted by family size for a period of at least five (5) years. The remaining units can be “market-rate.” Only existing structures with upper levels located in the downtown commercial core have been eligible for this kind of assistance and owners leveraged at least 25% of the total project costs. City staff and Lindsay Hager, of Hager Consulting, coordinated the grant projects which finished June 1<sup>st</sup>.

In addition to MSHDA Rental Rehab grants, Newaygo County and the NC Brownfield Authority joined with the City and DDA to establish brownfield plans that take part in the

restoration and safety updates needed in the four downtown buildings identified in the rental rehab program. The Brownfield Authority confirmed the building’s upstairs “functionally obsolescent” and authorized the building owner’s ability to capture most of the abatement and demolition costs related to the planned rental renovation projects, by way of Tax Increment Financing (TIF.) TIF’s permit capture of taxes levied from increased values following a development project, so participating property owners will capture all increased taxes until they are fully refunded their approved investment amounts. The State MEDC had to approve the TIF plan as well and County Housing Director Amanda Auw was instrumental in the brownfield approval process.

The City would like to congratulate and thank building owners like Merle Ross (2 E. Main St), Paul Mellema (10 S. Division Ave.) and Jud Afman (26 E. Main St.) for their recent investments in their downtown buildings and commitment to the community to provide affordable housing. Eight new rental units have been established and being filled at this time.

Regional collaboration efforts like this are what it takes these days to really make an effect in small downtowns, and we can be thankful for the participating entities and their representatives that took part in this process.

## PROPERTY TAX LEVY INCREASE FOR CITY OF FREMONT


The Fremont City Council recently approved an increase in the City’s operating property tax levy from 14 to 15 mills, effective with the 2016 summer tax billing. Since the market failures in 2009, the City’s overall tax valuations have not come back to that level for most of the properties; the City’s continued use of fund reserves from its’ General Fund has placed it below our recommended 15% reserve. For most properties, 15 mills at the 2016 Taxable Value rate

falls below the 2009 Taxable Value rate at the lessor 14 mills levy. The City’s Charter permits a maximum tax levy of 20 mills for general operating purposes and it is admirable that the City has been able to keep its’ levy relatively low through the 2009-2014 recession.

The revenue graph above shows that revenues from property and other taxes represent the largest (27%) percentage of total revenues while utility service charges and grants are close behind.

Although the expenditure table below shows an overall budget increase of 9.5% from last year, the General Fund only increased by 4.4%. The proposed Cedar Street Extension capital project is the result of the overall total increase. The DDA finished the Downtown Rental Rehab projects as well (-55%)

## GARAGE SALES:

### *A Fun and Thrifty Summer Pastime*

The City will be enforcing its' regulations on garage sale signs this summer. While many are thankful the City is doing so; others do not appreciate the effort. The regulations are being enforced because 1) the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) does not allow signs in their right-of-way, and many of the signs are placed along Main Street and Stewart Avenue in the MDOT right-of-way; 2) for safety reasons, signs should not be attached to utility poles; and 3) the signs are unattractive and often the signs are not taken down after the sale. Everyone has worked hard to keep Fremont looking neat, clean and beautiful for all to enjoy, so ridding the City of unnecessary signs is part of that effort.

The City understands that garage sales are important to many people; so as a result, the City organizes community garage sales in May and August. To participate, see below. The more people who participate in the community garage sale, the more energy the event will create. This translates into more people attending the various garage sales, which includes having visitors from outside the community take part; visitors who are good for local businesses. The community garage sales could have a positive economic impact not only for the individual home owner but for the community at-large.

## Fremont's Annual Community Yard Sale

It's time to get ready for Fremont's Annual Community Yard Sale. Our Spring-May Sale was a great success with over 65 participants. The late Summer date is scheduled for:

To participate, all you have to do is call or come into the Fremont City Office, give us your name, address and phone number, and you're on the list! You can sign up for all 3 days, or just 1 day. ## Recycling - Single Stream

Curbside recycling is a single-stream process, whereas all recyclables can be co-mingled in the blue recycling container. Make sure you place paper products at the bottom of the bin to prevent them from blowing out.

Curbside Recycling will increase \$9.00/quarter. Residents on refuse bag service who receive a quarterly bill for only recycling services are welcome to pay for their recycling services in advance on an annual basis to avoid having to write a check for such a small amount each quarter. Because rate adjustments are done in April, paying ahead could affect your first billing; after the credits have been used, you may receive a bill for the small difference. Paying ahead can also save on the City's printing and mailing costs, thus allowing us to maintain our current low rates.

\*Please place your recycling bin away from your 65 or 95 gallon cart as the garbage truck uses an arm to pick up these carts and if your bin is to close it could be broken from the weight of those arms.

## Remain Security Conscious

In these economic times, it is important to remain security conscious and to be aware of your surroundings. Keep your homes and garages locked when you are away, and be sure to remove your keys from the ignition and lock your vehicles whether your car is in your driveway at home, in store parking lots, or at school. Leave only those items in your yard that you can afford to lose, especially overnight. Finally, be respectful of your neighbors, watch out for each other and each other's property. If you have elderly neighbors, please check on them occasionally. Working together will keep the City of Fremont a great place to live, work and play.

## Curbside Refuse Service

Each residential dwelling may choose to use a 65- or 95-gallon rollout cart (garbage container with wheels) or buy special bags with the Allied Waste logos. For residents that choose bag service, this is a reminder that any item that does not fit into the mix-refuse bag will require a bulky item sticker if it is placed curbside on pick-up day. The cost for bulk item tags is \$3.00 per tag. Cart lids must be within 15" of being closed, otherwise no overloaded carts will be emptied. Any additional garbage that will not fit into the 65/95-gallon cart must be placed in the specially purchased **Mixed-Refuse Bags** and placed beside the cart. Empty carts and recycling bins must be removed from the curbside and placed in garages or side yards by 12:00 PM (noon) of the day after the scheduled pickup.

Effective April 1, 2016, the rate for the 65-gallon rollout cart is \$30.75/quarter and the 95-gallon rollout cart is \$36.00/quarter. The mixed refuse bags have also remained at \$2.00 per bag, or \$24.00 for a box of 12.

Other than new residents, the City only permits residents to stop and start their refuse/recycling services during the first two weeks of January and July each year. The property owner of the collection address may elect to change service from a roll-out cart to mixed-refuse bags or vice-versa by notifying the City Offices. **Changes are only allowed during these two-week periods.** Reminder: Any large items require a bulky sticker or appliance sticker which can be purchased at City Hall or Bill Shop-N-Save.

# BURNING ORDINANCE WITHIN CITY LIMITS

Section 4.1 (D)

Public or private bonfires in which material would **exceed three (3) feet in diameter** require a permit issued by the City Clerk and are subject to prior approval of the City Fire Department. Such approval may be granted at the sole discretion of the Clerk and Fire Department based upon:

- i. The proximity of the proposed bonfire to dwellings, trees and other structures.
- ii. Facilities available for fire management.
- iii. Atmospheric conditions.
- iv. Type of material to be burned.
- v. Any other consideration judged by the Clerk or Fire Department to be required to ensure safe burning.

## 2016 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

During the past Spring of 2016 construction season, the following street & utility system improvement was completed:

- Fremont Street – Replacing water main and street reconstruction

Remaining projects expected to be completed in 2016 and potentially 2017:

- Main Street – Install a right-turn lane on East Main Street approaching Stewart Avenue from the west
- Merchant Avenue – Mill and resurface between Pine Street and Sheridan Street
- Darling Avenue – Mill and resurface between Maple Street and Pine Street
- Cedar Street – Construct new street extension from Gerber Avenue to Stone Road (2017)

- July (Nominations must be submitted by June 17)

- September (Nominations must be submitted by Aug. 19)

Anyone may submit a nomination for either their own yard or someone else's yard, but the property being nominated must be located within the City of Fremont. ## Property Tax Payment Schedule

The City sends out property tax bills semi-annually. Summer taxes are mailed July 1<sup>st</sup> and are due by August 10<sup>th</sup>. A 4% late penalty is added to any unpaid taxes on August 11<sup>th</sup>. Summer taxes include millages for the Fremont Public Schools (both operating & debt levies), State Education, City, County Operating and Community Recreation Authority.

Winter taxes are mailed on December 1<sup>st</sup> and are due by February 14<sup>th</sup>. A 4% late penalty is added to any unpaid taxes on February 15<sup>th</sup>. Winter taxes include millages for Newaygo County, the Intermediated School District and the Fremont Area District Library.

For the convenience of our taxpayers, payments (check only no cash please) may be placed in the drop box at the north-west exit of the City Hall parking lot at any time. Payments can also be made by credit card or E-Check from our website at [www.cityoffremont.net](http://www.cityoffremont.net). The City accepts tax payments until February 29<sup>th</sup>. As of March 1<sup>st</sup> all payments must be made at the County Treasurer's Office, P.O. Box 885, White Cloud, MI 49349.

- Dispose of fireworks, especially sparklers, by soaking in water before placing them in a trash can
- Light one firework at a time.

## NEW FIREWORKS LAWS

Fireworks sold within the state are now allowed to be much louder and can leave the ground. Public Act 256 of 2011 legalizes consumer fireworks like bottle rockets and roman candles. Prior to the rule changes, Michigan's firework laws were relatively restrictive. The only fireworks allowed for legal use were novelty fireworks that did not leave the ground or explode, such as sparklers or smoke bombs.

### Consumer Fireworks are regulated as follows:

- (1) A person shall not ignite, discharge, or use consumer fireworks on public property, school property, church property, or the property of another person without that organization's or person's express permission to use those fireworks on those premises.
- (2) Consumer fireworks shall not be sold to a minor.
- (3) An individual shall not use consumer fireworks or low-impact fireworks while under the influence of alcoholic liquor, a controlled substance, or a combination of alcoholic liquor and a controlled substance
- (4) Local Ordinance does not allow for disturbing the peace. No person shall disturb the public peace and quiet by loud, boisterous or vulgar conduct or by making such excessive, unnecessary, or unusually loud noise, whether on public or private property, nor allow others under his control or direction to make such noise, which disturbs the peace, good order, health and safety of other persons, a neighborhood or the community in general.



## PRIMARY ELECTION: August 2, 2016

The August Primary Election is around the corner and you will start seeing evidence of it with candidate signs throughout the community. Voters will decide which candidates will represent them in the following local, state & federal offices:

- Representatives in the U.S. Senate and Congress
- Representatives in the State Legislature
- County Commissioner, Prosecutor, Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Drain Commissioner & Surveyor.

City residents are reminded that election signs are not to be placed in the City rights-of-way or to exceed 6 sq. ft. in face size, per the City Zoning Code. The city will remove and dispose of signs that are in violation.

The Newaygo County Clerk's Office continues to provide its internet site at [www.electionmagic.com](http://www.electionmagic.com) that posts current election results as they are reported to the County on election nights.

### Year 2016 Election Dates to remember include:

- ✓ **July 5th:** Last day to register for voting eligibility for the August 2nd Primary Election.
- ✓ **August 2nd:** Primary Election, Fremont Municipal Bldg. (polls open at 7am and close at 8pm)
- ✓ **October 11th:** Last day to register for voting eligibility for the November 8th General Election.
- ✓ **November 8th:** General Election, Fremont Municipal Bldg. (polls open at 7am and close at 8pm)



As a convenience to our City voters, if you or your spouse would like to be added to the City's permanent absentee voter (AV) list, please notify the City Offices at 924-2101. You will be mailed an AV application before each election and given the option to vote absentee or in person.

Please exercise your right to vote in all elections. We should all live by the adage that "if you don't vote, you don't have the right to complain!"

10. Place your phone number on the do not call list [www.donotcall.gov](http://www.donotcall.gov)




## BRUSH PICKUP


