Oak Arch & Darling Walkway Complete



A dedication ceremony was held on November 8, 2018 for the City of Fremont's 17th public art installation, the “Oak Arch”, which stands in the center of the Darling Avenue Walkway. The project was a Downtown beautification project for the Fremont community, which entailed removal of two blocks of Darling Avenue south of Main Street, and one block of Sheridan Street, between Darling and Merchant Avenues. Street pavement, curb/gutter, sidewalks, streetlights and the former high school parking areas west of the Rec Center were all removed to accommodate implementation of a decorative winding sidewalk with art nodes, landscaping, sitting areas, decorative lighting, a new parking lot and the “Oak Arch” sculpture. An outdoor pickle ball 6-court system in the Rec Center's southwest parking lot south of Maple Street was also constructed, with the final painting of the court system to be finished next spring.

Collaborative planning and fundraising between the City of Fremont, Downtown Development Authority, Public Art Committee, Fremont Community Recreation Authority, Fremont Area District Library and Newaygo County Pickleball Club, made it all possible.

In addition to creating a pleasant walkable path and sitting areas between the Downtown, Library, Rec Center and The Gateway, a new public parking lot was constructed to accommodate all of above entities during normal operation and special events. Implementation of the new outdoor pickle ball courts are a much-anticipated recreational opportunity for many as well.

REFUSE CONTAINER CHANGES

During the first two weeks of January and July each year, the property owner of the collection address may elect to change service from a roll-out cart to mixed-refuse bags or vice-versa by notifying the City Offices. Changes are only allowed during these two-week periods.



PHARMACEUTICAL DRUG COLLECTION DROP-BOX

The Fremont Police Department has a secure pharmaceutical drug collection drop-box. Community members are welcome to come to the front lobby of the Police Department where unwanted medications may be turned in anonymously.

Medications in standard containers may be deposited in those containers. Loose medication can be put into plastic bags and then deposited. Please ensure any liquid medication is enclosed in secure containers and placed in a plastic bag before depositing. Syringes are NOT accepted.

Once collected, staff will ensure the medication is disposed of according to State and Federal laws.



City Snow Plowing Policy

The Department of Public Works (DPW) will quickly address specific road hazards like icy intersections or drifted sections of road. Around 1" accumulation of snow, the salt crew will begin salting operations. The crew will salt the main roads (Main, Stewart & Stone), all intersections, roads with curves and steep slopes. To completely salt every street would be prohibitively expensive and would result in damage that is corrosive to streets, light poles, lawns and trees. It would also greatly increase the salinity of our area's lakes and streams, causing stress on our fish and wildlife populations. Following an accumulation of 2", the crews begin plowing operations of the entire street system.

Typically crews are called in during the early morning hours (approximately 4:00 AM) to begin opening up the major routes for business & school bus usage. We also have to clear the parking lots downtown before the breakfast crowd hits the restaurants. Typically, DPW uses the sidewalk brush or blower downtown to move the snow onto Main Street where it is plowed toward the center of the street and removed later in the day, most of the time by early afternoon. The sidewalk



plow will begin clearing residential sidewalks once the streets are clear.

When snow continues all day, it is difficult to completely remove the City's snow - especially downtown. Cars parked along the streets and in the downtown parking lots prevent the DPW from making a clean sweep of these areas during the day. It is very important for residents to comply with the "no parking" on City streets between the hours of 2:00 AM and 7:00 AM in order to allow snowplows proper access.

Above all, please stay safe and warm during our winter season.



HOUSE NUMBERS – Need to be Prominently Displayed

Per City Ordinance, all houses or buildings within the City of Fremont should have their house or building number prominently displayed. Such numbers should be of sufficient size and displayed in such a manner that they are easily read from the street. The Police/Fire Departments recommend a minimum of 4" in size. This is important so in case of emergency the house or building can be found by police officers, firefighters or other emergency responders.

PARKING-BAN ON STREETS DURING WINTER

Every Winter season, beginning December 1st, residents are not to park in the streets between the hours of 2 AM and 7 AM. The Public Works Department can not effectively plow the streets with vehicles parked along the curb. Effective April 1st, the winter on-street parking ban will be lifted, and residents may again park overnight on City streets.

REMAIN SECURITY CONSCIOUS

In these economic times, it is important to remain security conscious and to be aware of your surroundings. Keep your homes and garages locked when you are away, and be sure to remove your keys from the ignition, and lock your vehicles whether your car is in your driveway at home, in store parking lots, or at school. Leave only those items in your yard that you can afford to lose, especially overnight. Finally, be respectful of your neighbors, watch out for each other and each other's property. If you have elderly neighbors, please check them occasionally. Working together we will keep the City of Fremont a great place to live, work and play.



Recycling 101, From Cart-Right Recycling

Curbside recycling in the City of Fremont has been a great way to reduce our trash levels and the cost to remove them, and preserve resources for future generations.

At Cart-Right Recycling, we've enjoyed serving Fremont for the past 12 years, and we've seen big changes in resident's participation levels over that time. We started our business with a small trailer, sorting recyclables right at the curb, and in 2014 we were proud to begin offering "Single Stream Recycling." This process made it more convenient for residents, allowing placement of all your recyclables in one container without having to sort them. It made it more convenient for us as well, whereas they are now sorted at the drop-off facility in Kent County.

Although the process is easier for you and our staff, we believe it has generated a "contamination" issue as well, whereas certain waste items that are not recyclable are being placed into the recycling bins and have to be sorted out and removed later in the process. Contamination items are food waste and other trash, wires/electronics, hoses, Styrofoam, and various other items not accepted within the recycling program.

We've been experiencing this problem for some time in the City of Fremont, and have been happy to take an opportunity to raise awareness and educate our residents and homeowners, but lately there has been an increasing amount of incidences.

We find the biggest problem is just confusion from eager recyclers about what they can and cannot put into their bins. The items that can't be recycled that we see in the bins most often are:

- Styrofoam, also known as polystyrene
- Boxes that are not empty, or aren't flattened
- Clothes hangers, of any kind
- Jars and containers that are not clean, or that contain any kind of food waste
- Plastic wrappers, bread bags, potato chip bags, food storage (Ziploc style) bags, paper plates, napkins, tissues, paper toweling
- "Tanglers" like wires, cords, electronics, hoses and tarps
- Dishes, pots and pans, windows and mirrors
- tying up recyclables into a bag, if we can't see your items, our machines can't sort out the materials inside

We can accept lots of items! Like flattened cardboard, juice cartons, clean glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, jugs, paper, paperboard and magazines, plastic shopping bags, clean pizza boxes, metal cans and clean tin foil, as detailed on the enclosed recycling guide.

CART-RIGHT



RECYCLING

Cardboard

Flatten boxes, remove plastic and foam. Tape and labels are OK. **Clean** pizza boxes are OK!



Plastic Bottles, Jugs, & Tubs

Clean, rigid plastic only. **NO FOAM**. Labels are OK. **NEW**: Rinse & keep cap on.



Metal Cans & Foil

CLEAN; labels are OK. Aerosol cans **MUST** be empty.



NEW! Cartons

Coated paperboard that held liquid: milk, soy & almond milk, juice boxes, creamer, broth.

Keep caps on.



Paper, Paperboard & Magazines

Remove plastic bags. Shred only what is necessary and place shredding in clear plastic bag.



Glass Bottles & Jars

CLEAN, clear & colored food or beverage glass. Remove lids (if metal). Labels are OK.



Plastic Shopping Bags

Stuff bags inside another bag and tie shut.

TANGLERS

Anything stringy, like cords, cables, hoses, clothing, tarps, chains, tubing, wires

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

Anything that held hazardous liquids, powders or gases including propane & helium tanks; medical waste including needles & IV bags; batteries

UNACCEPTABLE FOR OUR FACILITY

Electronics; anything larger than 2'x2'; foam containers and packaging material; glass from windows, doors & mirrors; Pyrex and bakeware; giftwrap; dirty or unwashed products




