Fremont Adopt-a-block Neighborhood Beautification Program

The City of Fremont is focusing more on its residential neighborhoods in order to keep them beautiful and healthy. With a focus on neighborhood improvement, the City is pleased to be able to facilitate the 2nd Annual Fremont Adopt-a-block Neighborhood Beautification Program.

This Program helps improve neighborhoods and simultaneously it helps individual residents tackle some small but often noticeable home improvement issues. The City identifies blocks within Fremont that may have one or more properties that need attention. All the property owners on the block are sent a letter and invited to submit an application to request property improvement work to be performed during a week in August. Churches and service organizations are invited to serve by organizing a group of volunteers who will work on one or more properties to address property beautification and home energy related issues. Through the Program it has become quite clear that Fremont is a place where a lot of caring people live who are willing to spend their time and resources to make the lives of others better and to make our community a nicer place to live.

This year the following organizations participated in the Fremont Adopt-a-block Neighborhood Beautification Program by making improvements to nine (10) properties:

Take Pride in Your Curbside!

The City sweeps all the streets in spring and fall, but weeds begin to creep up in the cracks by mid-summer. The City does spray for weeds along the curbs in late summer, but during a majority of the summer the city's curbsides and sidewalks appear overgrown in various areas.

Our **Deadhead Committee**, a group of citizens that volunteer their time to de-weed downtown flowerbeds and parking lots, encourage residents to "take pride in your curbside!" Weeds are commonly removed by weed-killer products, pulled while the soil is damp or by a motorized weed-whip. Residents and their lawn-care providers should blow cut grass back onto the lawn while mowing or with a blower to avoid grass and weed seedlings from filling the seams in the curbing and sidewalks.

A lot of time and energy is spent by residents to keep their yard and surrounding area tidy and pleasant. We encourage you to join them in their efforts.

Brush Chipping is Coming to An End

The City will continue to remove brush without charge, the first Monday of each month April through October. The last brush pick up for the 2014 season will be the first Monday in October. Brush must be stacked with the cut end at curbside with limbs no more than three inches (3") in diameter. The City will not remove remaining tree-top brush from a tree removed by either the owner or a private tree removal

company. The program is intended for routine tree/bush trimming and fallen branches. Residents throughout the City must have their brush placed curbside by 7:30 a.m. of each first Monday morning. Brush is not to be placed at curbside any earlier than the Friday before the first Monday. The City will also continue to provide curbside chipping of Christmas trees the first two weeks of January.

Voter ID Reminder

Voters will be asked to provide identification when they visit the polls on Election Day. They will be asked to present a valid photo ID, such as a Michigan driver's license, federal or state government issued photo I.D., passport, military identification card with photo, student identification with photo or tribal identification card with photo.

Anyone who does not have an acceptable form of photo ID or failed to bring it with them to the polls can still vote. They will be required to sign a brief affidavit stating that they're not in possession of photo ID. Their ballots will be included with all others and counted on Election Day.

2014 Construction Season Nears End

Great progress has been made in terms of the number of street improvements that have been completed during this construction season. The City appreciates how well our residents and business owners adjusted to alternate routes this past summer when so many of our street improvement projects were underway.

The following street improvements are some that have been completed this year:

- Oak Street – Replacing water main, sanitary sewer main, street and some sidewalks & curb/gutter on Oak Street, from Stewart Avenue to Weaver Avenue
- DT Beautification – Installation of new decorative fencing system around the remaining three blocks of Downtown (see picture below)

- Cemetery – Installation of new and replacement of old fencing with new decorative fence along northern border (see picture below)

Remaining projects expected to be completed in 2014:

- Branstrom Park Multi-Purpose Court / Ice Rink – Construct pavilion/roof over the court to keep snow and rain off the court, which will accommodate more time for activities on the court
- Apache – Mill and resurface from Stewart Avenue to Iroquois
- Pine Street – Mill and resurface from Stewart Avenue to East Avenue

City of Fremont Drinking Water Notice

Tests showed coliform bacteria in City of Fremont water

Although not an emergency, the City's water system was recently in violation of a drinking water standard.

The City routinely (monthly) monitors for drinking water contaminants and during the month of July there were two (2) of twelve (12) samples that showed the presence of coliform bacteria and the standard is that no more than one (1) sample per month may do so.

What does this mean?

Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria are present. Coliforms were found in more samples than were allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

Usually, coliforms are a sign that there could be a problem with the system's treatment or distribution system (pipes). Whenever we detect coliform bacteria in any sample, we do follow-up testing to see if other bacteria of greater concern, such as fecal coliform or E. coli, are present. We did not find any of these bacteria in our subsequent testing, and further testing shows that this problem has been resolved.

What was done?

Following additional sampling of the system, and talking to our representative from the DEQ Office of Drinking Water, it was determined that this was on a very isolated section of our system and that is why a boil water notice was not issued. The City injected additional chlorine into the overall system, sampled the sites again and the results came back negative for bacteria.



Safety Reminders

With the new school year upon us, and the school buses no longer running city routes, our Police Dept and Crossing Guards would like to remind residents and parents of the following dangerous situations during drop-off & pickup times at the area's schools, intersections and side streets:

- ◆ Failing to Stop completely at signed intersections.
- ◆ Not securing children in seatbelts or safety seats.
- ◆ Speeding through School Crossing zones and side streets.
- ◆ Distracted drivers using cell phones, grooming, etc.

Your Police Dept will take a zero tolerance approach toward those violators who put others at risk. We recognize that many parents must drive their children to/from school, and we only ask that you please allow yourself extra time to make the trip safely and stress-free.

Fremont Community Joint Zoning Ordinance – Did You Know?

In a residential district, no more than twenty-five percent (25%) of the front yard may be used for parking, including driveways. Vehicles may not be parked or stored upon any lawn or landscaped area within the front yard.

Fox, Coyote and Bobcat Sightings Are on the

Although fox, coyote and bobcats have lived in these areas for many years, the popu-



lation is on the rise and increased sightings have caused concern among residents that their pets or children may be in jeopardy.

As development in rural areas increase, the chance for interaction between coyotes, bobcats, and people increase. Just because you see coyotes or bobcats, there is no reason to assume they are causing problems or about

to cause problems.

They primarily feed on small mammals such as mice and voles and will occasionally feed on some game species such as rabbits, turkeys and even deer.

If you suspect or know you have coyotes in your area, a few simple precautions can greatly reduce chances of a negative encounter. Predators in urban areas are generally hunting for typical prey; mice thrive in tall grass, under buildings, in trash, and in vacant lots. Reducing habitat for prey species by removing brush piles and mowing areas of tall grass or taking other steps to reduce rodent populations decreases the chance that predators will frequent your yard. Bringing pet foods in at night and placing trash out the morning of pick up can help. **NEVER INTENTIONALLY FEED A FOX, COYOTE OR BOBCAT.**

They generally retain a natural fear of people even when they adjust to frequenting urban areas. Taking a few precautions will help make it enjoyable to have an occasional sighting or hear a coyote howl at night.



Pharmaceutical Drug Collection Drop-Box

The Fremont Police Department has installed a secure pharmaceutical drug collection drop-box. Community members are welcome to come to the front lobby of the Police Department where unwanted medications may be turned in anonymously.

Medications in standard containers may be deposited in those containers. Loose medication can be put into plastic bags and then deposited. Please ensure any liquid medication is enclosed in secure containers and placed in a plastic bag before depositing. Syringes are also welcome.

Once collected, staff will ensure the medication is disposed of according to State and Federal laws.

Fremont Rental Rehabilitation Housing Program

The City of Fremont has been awarded grant funding from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) in the amount of \$483,000 to help fund the Fremont Rental Rehabilitation Housing Program. This will allow the City to fund eight (8) new upper level housing units above commercial space in buildings downtown Fremont and to fund rehabilitation of two (2) existing upper level downtown apartments. Thanks to the Newaygo County Brownfield Authority for granting funds to the City to assist with required environmental services that are mandated by MSHDA. The rehab projects should be completed in the spring of 2015.

Winter 2014 Property Tax Payment Schedule

Winter taxes will be mailed on Friday, November 28, 2014 and due by Tuesday, February 17, 2015. A 4% penalty is added to any unpaid tax bills. Winter taxes include millage rates for Newaygo County, Intermediate School District, Fremont Area District Library and on occasion, a County Drain.

Taxes can now be paid online by credit card or e-check at www.cityoffremont.net (see "CREDIT CARDS ARE NOW BEING ACCEPTED" section in this newsletter for more details).

For the convenience of our taxpayers, payments (by check only) may be placed in the drop box at the north-west exit of the City Hall parking lot. The City accepts taxes payments until Saturday, February 28, 2015; on March 1, 2015 all payments must be paid to the Newaygo County Treasurer's Office at PO Box 885, White Cloud, MI 49349.

November 4, 2014 Gubernatorial Election

On Tuesday, November 4, 2014 the Gubernatorial Election will take place and voters decide who will lead Michigan for the next four years. Voters will select candidates for the following offices on the upcoming ballot:

Governor U.S. Congressional Representative (2nd District)
State Senator (34th District) State Representative (100th District)
County Commissioner (1st & 2nd Districts)



City residents are reminded that, per City Code, election signs are not to be placed in the City street rights-of-way. They may not be placed, nailed or affixed to any tree, utility pole, light, sign or lamp post or other object within the area between the curb and sidewalk along all City streets. Non-conforming signs will be removed without notice or compensation.

The Newaygo County Clerk's Office will again provide election results through the Internet site at www.electionmagic.com. Current election results, as they are reported to the County Clerk's Office, will be posted on election night. Upcoming 2014 election dates to remember:

- ☑ **October 6, 2014:** Last day to register for voting eligibility for the November 4th City Election.
- ☑ **November 4, 2014:** City General Election, 101 E. Main Street, Fremont. Polls open at 7 AM and close at 8 PM.

As a convenience to our City voters, if you or your spouse would like to be added to the City's permanent absentee voter (AV) list, please stop by the City Offices with proof of identity, and you will be added to the list.
